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Executive Director's Spotlight

What a Difference Two Years Makes!

Wow! Two years have now passed since taking the reigns to help guide and reshape Hays County Crime Stoppers. It has been a wild ride with a lot of changes, updates, new friends, community partners, and experiences.

I want to first thank the Board of Directors for trusting in me. You have allowed some of my crazy ideas to become reality, and it has truly elevated Hays County Crime Stoppers back to being one of the leading names in Crime Stoppers in Texas!

Another big thank you goes out to all our law enforcement partners (Hays County Sheriff's Office, San Marcos Police Department, Kyle Police Department, Buda Police Department, Texas State University-San Marcos Police Department, and Hays County District Attorney's Office). Your support and eagerness to reinvigorate our program means more than words can say.

So far this year, our program has hosted a conference to bring together teens, educators, and law enforcement professionals to tackle serious problems that our kids face in school and help to guide them to be active and engage in keeping their campus communities safe. We spent a good part of the year examining our bylaws, leading to a complete overhaul and revision to bring the bylaws completely up to date. Charmaine has been a true godsend when it comes to organizing and ensuring all our bases are covered.

We continue to make efforts to be more financially sound. We switched banking establishments and continue to work toward modernizing. We introduced our EZ Child Identification system successfully, being able to do digital fingerprints, photographs, and videos saved to a thumb drive for parents to have in case of an emergency.

We expanded our Campus Crime Stoppers programs from a sole program at Hays High School to three additional programs at Johnson High School, San Marcos High School, and Lehman High School. These programs are a great way for high school students to learn how to better keep their communities safe and are guided by outstanding school resource officers and school faculty that care about campus safety.

In 2022, our program assisted law enforcement in arresting 50 suspects that had warrants or who had participated in recent crimes. This year, as of October 1, 2023, we have assisted law enforcement in arresting 33 suspects, and we still have three more months to go. We expanded our Most Wanted program to include Most Wanted offenders (violent offenses), Sex Offenders, Wanted (non-violent offenders), and Parole Violators.

This month, HCCS supports victims and survivors of domestic violence by publishing wanted posters of suspects wanted for felony domestic violence crimes and stalking crimes. We are partnering with the Hays-Caldwell Women's Center to bring a strong message that victims and survivors of domestic violence do not stand alone. We will be sharing resources and information regarding the seriousness of domestic violence throughout the month in support of this effort. Furthermore, we encourage everyone to wear purple as much as possible in support of victims and survivors.




What kinds of tips can be reported at schools?

Students/Faculty/Staff can report any type of illegal weapon or illegal drugs, gang activity, fighting and bullying. Dating violence and assaults are also crimes to be reported. Students are encouraged to call our crime stopper tip line (800-324-8477) or submit a tip on the P3 App for such illegal activity.

The anonymous caller will not be asked to provide any personal information such as name, address, school ID, or phone number. The student will be asked to provide as much information as possible on the suspect:

- Name,
- · Clothing,
- Hair color,
- School or classroom



- What was seen?
- Location
- Describe vehicle if used



The student will be issued a number code for future use. Upon investigation, if the information provided leads to an arrest, that student may be eligible for a cash reward. Any updates on the tip will be documented and available for the tipster to review. Tipsters can login to P3 and check on the status or any instructions.

Overview of HCSO Special Services Division

The Special Services Division within the Hays County Sheriff's Office is primarily responsible for locating and apprehending violent felony subjects. The relationship between Hays County Crime Stoppers and the Special Services Division proves to be an invaluable resource.

Crime Stoppers tips allow citizens throughout Hays County to provide anonymous information to law enforcement investigators which streamlines the process of locating individuals with warrants. Investigators rely on this information to not only locate the fugitives, but also to build additional criminal cases.


But that is not the only way you can help...

Bringing Attention to Domestic Violence

For over 45 years, HCWC has been the local resource for domestic violence survivors in our community. Our mission is focused on providing healing, support and advocacy to adults, youth and children who experience violence and abuse.

A core part of our work is collaborating with local partners, like Hays County Crimestoppers to bring attention to this very important issue. Holding domestic violence offenders is a critical part of the work in ensuring safety for survivors.

But we also recognize that this can also escalate danger for survivors. It is with this knowledge that we encourage anyone who is experiencing a form of violence to reach out to HCWC for free and confidential services, even if your situation doesn't involve the criminal justice system. We offer safety planning, crisis intervention, counseling, legal advocacy and emergency shelter. 
Hello from an SRO

He also served on the Hays County Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) and was part of the Hays County Citizens Sheriff's Academy Alumni Association. Mike remained active in the VFW Post 6441 in Wimberley. He will be dearly missed and fondly remembered by Hays County Crime Stoppers.

Bylaws Update

Any time you join with fellow community members with a common goal in mind there will be challenges in how multiple voices communicate and what the vision is for the group. Often we get so excited about "our mission" that we forget "our standards for operating."

This is where bylaws are important for establishing the ground rules of how a group will function. Having strong bylaws helps members predict how to properly share an idea or goal, and what is expected of them in their service to the board. Bylaws also ensure that organizations keep balance within their ranks to represent the group or community as a whole so everyone gets a seat at the table.

Recently, Hays County Crime Stoppers Association revamped its bylaws for the first time in many, many years. I had the opportunity to lead this effort. As I prepared for this large task, I reviewed what worked well in other organizations and how to best serve our community. I was inspired to look at a lot of nonprofit charities and organizations serving millions of Central Texas residents. Multiple board members gave valuable input, helping to develop the most thorough set of bylaws this organization has ever had.

Here are three areas we improved:

#1 Remote Involvement in Meetings. The way we communicate and the way we vote looks a lot different from when Crime Stoppers came to Hays County in the 1980s. The way we communicate has significantly changed from just five years ago. Since the bylaws were first written, and through their many iterations, allowing for electronic or video participation seemed unnecessary. That all changed when March 2020 halted our regular meeting style due to the COVID-19 shutdown worldwide.

Like many organizations, we found ourselves connecting only through video, e-mail or by phone. The new bylaws provide a means for individuals to be present by video, exactly how you can vote by video and what it means to give a vote. Establishing a remote participation and voting procedure will help keep accurate records and allow for flexibility no matter what changes come to society.

#2 Executive Director Duties Outlined. The Executive Director of the Hays County Crime Stoppers serves and assists the board in carrying out the mission of Crime Stoppers, but in previous bylaws the expectations were vague and unclear.

The new bylaws outline in detail what duties the Executive Director has and help establish some wiggle room to add or modify those duties. I appreciate this update because I know how frustrating it can be to have a vaguely defined role for a group and constantly wonder if I'm working in line with expectations or if I'm overstepping my role. Outlining important roles strengthens leadership. This change is a positive step up from our previous bylaws.

#3 Mandatory Bylaw Review. These new bylaws have built in an automatic review process; every five years there is a mandatory review and proposed update that must happen. This means we will be proactive in modifying to the changing society we live in and that we're continually looking and questioning to see if we can be more ethical, more inclusive and more fair in the work we do and the service we provide to our community. Our bylaws will not be stagnant again because we will have a preset review deadline to make sure we are aware of how things have changed.

I realize bylaws are not the area of governance most of us enjoy. They tend to be multiple pages and often use technical language that feel like you're learning the rules of a really long and complicated board game. I'll admit that I myself took many reading, writing, and reviewing sessions with breaks intertwined to get through the bylaw update process. (A big thank you to Dr Pepper Zero for helping me through these times.)

The efforts were worth it to establish the Hays County Crime Stopper board as one of the most forward-thinking, innovative nonprofit organizations in Hays County. I can't really say I'm glad it's done, because I know, as mentioned in #2 above, that this whole process will happen again, but hopefully it's not as lengthy of an update because of the work we've done this year.

At least we can enjoy the fruits of our labor for the next five years and see how the changes have a positive impact on our work.

Until next time, you can find me at the board meeting (in person or by video) working alongside other board members to keep our community safer.
